Of the former, it seems likely that at least 25 separate individuals were recorded, and of the latter, at least 6 (including one caught at Wallsend Swallow Ponds on 31st, not included in the main report). During the same period, the Isle of May recorded a maximum count of 8 Wrynecks, but had no Icterines.
