A month of several very cold spells accompanied by strong onshore winds. In consequence, oil slicks were driven quite close to the shore and affected large numbers of Auks and also a few livers. A count along the whole length of the forthumberland and Forth Durham coast lines revealed that at least 1500 birds had been washed ashore. A verbal report claimed that 1000 birds per day were being picked up in the budle Bay area during a short period in mid month, but no figures are available. Distressed Divers also sought the shelter of fresh water and one appeared as far inland as hittle Dene, remaining there for at least a fortnight. eige, 05 tacul is had

Duck numbers were again high and this winter appears to have been particularly good for Goldeneye, Scaup, and Goosander. Another Smew was found, this time in north Forthumberland, and up to 6 Rewick's Swans remained in the Ashington area.

The Aln estuary again produced a winter Greenshank for the third year remains and the December Black Redstart was again seen at Seaton Sluice were a Little Gull appeared in mid wonth.

The Thitburn Shore Barks were there throughout the month, often seeking the comparative warmth of a local pit heap and providing many observers with very good views.

The proposed boat trips to the arnes area never materialised because of the adverse weather, and it seems that, after last year's disappointments we are doomed to fail in this particular venture.

To date, Jebruary has produced a large count of coosander at Whittle Dene, and a mediterranean Gull and a mittern at Gosforth Park.

At the same time many others were noted close inshere including a Little Auk at Seaton Sluice on 18th (SE). Loving S. at 100/hr. at amburgh on 18th and at c40/hr. at Seaton Sluice on 31st (ERM/BG). On the latter date most were Guillenots and again the majority were clearly oiled. Some were so badly handicapped that they were repeatedly being chased by Black Backs.

The major activity of the month was the wildfowl count organised for 22nd and despite the very mixed weather 64 waters were covered by a total of 29 members. A detailed report, plus results, is enclosed with this bulletin. Gosferth Park from about 8th

As in December, Divers were again restless and were particularly prominent moving N. on 15th/16th during anticyclonic conditions and very

There were some fluctuations in wildfowl numbers but apart from Goldeneye and Goosander a general decline was noticeable since last month, particularly with Mallard and Teal. The Whittle Dene Snew was again seen on several occasions whilst another was found just over the Border. A few Bean Geese made a welcome reappearance at their favourite spot in the West of Worthumberland whilst Brent Geese reached a peak of 1100 at Holy Island early in the month.

The 15th saw the appearance of 2, perhaps 3, species of large raptor at Holywell one of which may have been a Rough Legged Buzzard.

It is interesting that no Green Sandpipers were seen at Whittle Dene this month but 3 were seen together not far away on the Tyne at Dilston on 28th. The inference is obvious!

Of the passerines that were recorded, a few Waxwings, a Great Grey Shrike and a flock of Twite were the most unusual.

At the time of writing (mid march) the Bean Geese are still at Grindon Lough and have reached a total of just under 40. HIVE TROOF

Wildfowl Count - 22nd February, 1970.

A total of 64 stretches of water, divided into 9 groups, was covered by 29 members and included all the major areas in Northumberland, N. Durham, a 10 mile stretch of the R. Tweed upstream from Berwick and 2 lakes (Yetholm and Hoselaw) just over the Scottish border in the North West.

Because of the difficulties in organising simultaneous coverage of 60-70 miles of coastline, no attempt was made to count wildfowl either roosting or feeding offshore. For this reason the abundant Eider has been omitted from the table shown overleaf, but it is perhaps worth recording that there were about 1200 in the Lindisfarne Reserve area on the day of the count.

A surprising absentee in the table is Shoveler - not a single bird to be found, and one would have expected more than 1 little Grebe to have been present at this time of the year.

The waters that drew a blank were Pallinsburn, Crag Lough, Little Swinburn, Ryal, Bolam, Rothley and Tunstall (Durham). Others not included in the table were as follows:

SUMMARY.

With low pressure persisting to the E. of Britain for 7 days from 4th, moderate N - NE winds resulted in a Northerly movement of sea birds including Divers, Fulmars and Gannets but the cold airstream delayed the arrival of Summer visitors.

A weak ridge of high pressure extending N. over Britain on 12th brought a few new Wheatears and Chiffchaffs and a N. passage of Meadow Pipits but we had to wait until 15th before the high pressure area intensified over N. Spain and gave us a warmer S.W. airstream. During the next few days Summer visitors became increasingly significant and by 18th Common Sandpipers, Willow Warblers, Swallows, Sand Martins and Yellow Wagtails had all reached us and Meadow Pipits were moving N. in their hundreds. By 20th, however, a cooler N.W. airstream had become established as a depression to the N. of Britain exerted its influence and the flow of Summer migrants ceased.

During the last few days of the month another weak ridge extended N. from Iberia and a further arrival of Summer visitors was noted. In addition another heavy N. movement of sea birds occurred between 25th - 29th involving Manx Shearwaters, Fulmars, Gannets, Lesser Black Backs and a few Skuas.

No real rarities were reported during the month but it is worth drawing attention to the absence of Common Whitethroat and Swift records both of which are usually noted before the end of April. It looks as though the Whitethroat is going to be a rare bird again this

Early May has been more rewarding with Little Egret, Scarlet Grosbeak, Red-breasted Flycatcher, Wrynecks, Bluethroats, Barred Warbler and Shore Larks but more about that next month.

Tawny Owl:A very grey bird on Holy Island on 19th (ERM/CW) seems to be only the third record for the Island.

Short-eared Owl:-Pair at Alwinton on 25th (RN).

Great Spotted Woodpecker:On 18th, 1 watched heading out to sea from Bamburgh (BRS).

Shore Lark:Last noted at Whitburn on 13th when 12 were present (BU).

Swallow:First noted on 14th with 1 at Stocksfield (LG). Another was seen there on 17th when 1 was at Hartley and by 18th they were moving N. at 30 per hour at Bamburgh. Thereafter recorded throughout area but still quite scarce by end of month.

House Martin:
First noted on 19th when 1 at Seahouses (RA/RAK) and 5 in Gosforth Park (SJH). Next day 1 at Ellington (TH) and on 25th 1 at Bamburgh (BRS) and 2 at Staward (JDP). No other records.

Sand Martin:First noted on 15th when 3 were seen at Holywell (CED) subsequently became increasingly regular throughout Northumberland. By 18th they were moving N. at 90 per hour at Bamburgh and on 23rd/24th, 100+ at Felton (TH) and 150 at Gosforth Park (BG).

Hooded Crow:3 at Bamburgh on 5th (BRS), 1 at Amble on 10th and 1 on Holy Island on 11th (B & TH).

Fieldfare: Still plentiful at end of month, particularly inland. Larger flocks were 300 near Meldon on 12th and Stannington on 21st, (JKJ/KGD), 200 at each of Scots Gap and Longframlington on 1st, Bamburgh on 12th, Stocksfield on 16th and Rudchester on 23rd. 100 at Kibblesworth on 22nd - 29th and Stocksfield on 30th.

Redwing: -

Never many April records and this year no exception. 1 at Bamburgh on 12th - 19th (BRS), 4 in Newcastle on 14th (MRS) and 3 on Holy Island on 18th (MFMM et al).

Ring Ouzel:-

Apparently established in Upper Coquetdale and Allendale early in month (ERM/RG/WB).

Wheatear:-

Not really regular until after about 9th when they became more numerous both inland and at the coast. Coastal passage was most significant on 11th/12th and 18th/19th when up to 20 were at Holy Island, Bamburgh and Hauxley.

Redstart:-

The first was 1 on Holy Island on 23rd/24th (MFMM) then 1 at Cresswell on 25th (CW). No other records.

Black Redstart: -

1 at Hauxley on 13th (HRS).

Grasshopper Warbler:-

First noted on 23rd/24th when 1 at Hauxley (HRS). Next day 3 at Bamburgh but no more records.

Blackcap: -

l at Cresswell on 15th - the first (TH). On 18th, 1 on Holy Island (ERM et al) and on 21st 1 at Felton (TH). On 24th/25th, 2 at Hauxley (HRS) and 1 at S. Linton (CW). 1 in South Shields on 30th (RAK).

Willow Warbler: -

A very early bird at Staward on 4th (JDP?, but no nore records until main arrival on 18th when they were noted throughout Northumberland and N. Durham. Many subsequent records.

Chiffchaff:-

1 at Bamburgh on 11th and 1 at Hauxley on 12th. A few arrived with Willow Warblers on 18th and 3 out of 6 on Holy Island were noticeably large and quite grey. Widespread thereafter but still scarce.

Goldcrest: -

A light fall noted at Bamburgh and Hauxley on 11th/12th and again on 18th when there were also 20 on Holy Island (HRS/BRS et al).

Spotted Flycatcher: -

1 at Denton Burn on 30th (BG) was the only record.

Meadow Pipit:-

Moving N. over Bamburgh and Hauxley on 11th in moderate numbers. A very heavy N. passage noted all along coast and even as far inland as Denton Burn on 18th, with a 1 - 2000 over Holy Island, and 300 per hour over Bamburgh.

Tree Pipit:-

Only 1 record: 3 at Bamburgh on 18th (BRS).

White Wagteil .-

Ones and twos noted both at coast and inland as far as Seaton Burn and Cramlington throughout the month.

Yellow Wagtail:-

3 at Washington on 18th were the first (BU) and next day 12 at Holywell (SJH/CED) and 1 on Holy Island (ERM). By 24th, 30 at Swallow Ponds (GU) and on 30th, 33 at Cresswell and 19 at South Linton.

Blue-headed Wagtail:-

A male trapped at Bamburgh on 25th (BRS) and 1 at Sheepwash on 26th (BMn).

Great Grey Shrike: -

1 at Rothbury on 1st (ERM) and on 18th near Greenlee Lough 1 (BMn).

Brambling: -

Late singles at Hauxley on 11th (HRS), and Holy Island and Bamburgh on 18th (ERM/BRS).

Corn Bunting:-

A roost of 35 in Gosforth Park on 7th (ERM).

MAY 1970 BULLETIN.

SUMMARY.

Quite a spectacular month and probably the best May on record for migrants, particularly the more uncommon species.

The weather throughout the month was dominated by high pressure areas either extending S.W. from Scandanavia or N. from the Mediterranean Countries and except for a spell of westerlies between 20th - 27th and again on 31st, winds prevailed from an easterly quarter throughout.

On 1st - 3rd with High over Scandanavia joining with a High over Spain a heavy fall of Willow Warblers occurred as a cloud front extended N - S over the North Sea. Most were 'large' birds suggesting a N. destination and 1 showed characteristics of 'acredula'. A Little Egret also appeared.

The Scandanavian High persisted until 16th but as a low centre pushed slowly N.E. from Biscay the wind freshened from the E. and cloud cover increased. From 4th onwards typical N. European migrants became increasingly common along the coast. The peak occurred on 9th/10th by which time Hobby, Wrynecks, Black Redstarts, Lesser Whitethroats, Red-breasted Flycatcher, Water Pipit and Scarlet Grosbeak had been recorded as well as the more regular waders and passerines.

Except for 2 Bluethroats on 11th the flow seemed to have halted as the Low was now centred over Germany but a High ridge extending N. from Italy from 12th - 14th might have been responsible for the Bluethroats, Barred Warbler, Red-backed Shrikes, Woodchat, Lapland Bunting and more Black Redstarts.

High centres over Scandanavia and the Azores linked by a ridge over Britain brought a further flow of migrants on 16th/17th, mainly Willow Warblers. The Westerlies from 20th onwards prevented further passerine falls but a heavy passage of Ringed Plover was noted as well as an influx of Little Gulls and some moderate sea bird movement.

A lull in the strong westerlies as a ridge extended N.E. over Britain to Scandanavia from 26th - 30th brought a heavy fall of Sedge and Willow Warblers, Spotted Flycatchers and an Icterine. Westerlies returned on 31st.

Other unusual species reported during month included Blue Winged Teal, Snow Goose, Albatross, Osprey, Grey Phalarope, Iceland Gull, Shore Lark and Grey Headed Wagtail as well as possible Spoonbill and Savi's Warbler.

June has brought Avocet, Whiskered Tern and another breeding record of Little Ringed Plover but details will be reserved until the next bulletin.

<u>Diver</u>: Recorded only at Hauxley and seen on 7 days with a maximum of 12 N. in $\frac{3}{4}$ hour on 24th (HRS).

Great Crested Grebe: Up to 5 at Hallington but only 1 present on 28th (CMA/ERM)

Red-necked Grebe: 2 off Holy Island on 7th and still 1 on 10th (MFMM)

Little Grebe: Present on many waters. 8 at Capheaton seemed to be largest count (CMA et al).

Albatross: 1 flying N. off St. Mary's on 7th was almost certainly a Black Browed (JDP).

confirmed this will be the first record for Northumberland although several other unidentified birds have been seen.

Manx Shearwater: Between 23rd - 31st, 43 Flew N. off Hauxley (HRS), 5 N. off Seaton Sluice (GU) and 3S. off Whitburn (per BU).

Fulmar: Moving N. off St. Mary's at 80 per hour on 7th (JDP) and up to 70 per hour off Hauxley on 7th, 10th and 24th (HRS).

Gannet: 160 per hour N. off St. Mary's on 7th (JDP), 130 per hour N. off Hauxley on 10th and 50 per hour N. there on 23rd/24th (HRS).

Heron: With the exception of up to 4 in the Bamburgh/Budle Bay area on 2nd - 25th (BRS) all records were of ones and twos well inland.

<u>Little Egret:</u> First seen at Budle Bay on 3rd a single bird spent at least a week in the area being last reported at Fenham Mill on 10th (IHA/MFMM/BRS et al). This is only the second record for Northumberland.

Spoonbill: 1 flying N. over Washington Ponds on 31st was reported as only third hand by B.U. Notes have been supplied but more details will be necessary for the record to be accepted.

Mallard: 46 at Gosforth on 12th was largest count (SJH). Many broods reported from all over Northumberland.

Blue Winged Teal: Full notes obtained on drake at Low Newton on 30th and later at Cresswell on 4th June (MTR). The possibility of an escape from captivity cannot be ruled out but if accepted by the Rarities Committee it will be the second record for Northumberland.

Garganey: 1 at Gosforth on 17th (SJH), a pair at Cresswell on 19th (MTR) and 1 at Washington from 28th until 2nd June (SJH/BU).

Gadwall: 2 at Cresswell on 9th (LGM/ERM), 1 at Brenkley on 17th (KGD/MH), and 2 at Low Newton on 30th/31st (MTR).

<u>Wigeon:</u> Stragglers were noted at Cresswell (1 - 3 on 2nd - 11th) Linton (2 on 12th) and Budle Bay (up to 4 from 16th - 31st).

Pintail: 2 at Grindon on 16th (LGM).

Shoveler: Continued to move through until late in month with as many as 17 in Gosforth Park on 12th and still 8 on 17th (SJH). Up to 6 noted at 8 other waters.

Tufted Duck: 52 at Gosforth on 14th (SJH) was by far the largest count.

<u>Pochard:</u> Still 33 at Gosforth on 14th (SJH). Bothal was only other place where they were seen with up to 3 between 14th - 26th (MTR/MH).

Goldeneye: 1 at Holywell on 2nd (CED), 1 at Amble on 12th (CMA) and 3 in Budle Bay on 10th (BRS).

Long-tailed Duck: 1 off Holy Island on 7th (MFMM).

Common Scoter: 12 off Cresswell on 2nd (JA.McC) and 6 off Bamburgh on 24th (BRS).

Red-breasted Merganser: Noted only off Hauxley with up to 3 between 2nd and 25th (HRS).

Goosander: Reported in breeding areas at Catcleugh, Langleeford, N. Tyne and Staward during month.

Shelduck: Maximum of 95 in Budle Bay on 24th (BRS). Off Hauxley, 13N on 22nd and 8 N. on 24th (HRS). 2 at Holywell on 10th - 16th (CED).

Grey Lag Goose: 1 on Holy Island on 1st and 8th (MFMM), 1 at Fontburn on 3rd (CED), 1 N. off Cresswell on 19th (TH) and 1 at Grindon on 28th - 30th (MRS/JA.McC).

Pink Footed Goose: The tame Cresswell bird still present and flying freely on 29th (ERM). Snow Goose: Full notes obtained on an adult flying N. off Seaton Sluice on 28th (GB). Barnacle Goose: 1 still at Sweethope Lough on 24th (B & ME).

Canada Goose: 26 at Sweethope on 24th (B & ME) and 2 at Washington on 30th (BU). 6 plus a pair with 4 young at Hallington on 19th (RG/WB/EL).

Whooper Swan: 4 at Colt Crag on 3rd (RN).

Sparrow Hawk: 2 reported from inland sites. At the coast single passage birds were seen at Bamburgh on 9th, Holy Island on 1st (MFMM) and Cresswell on 22nd (TH).

Osprey: 3 birds seen: 1 at Holywell from 16th - 19th (B & ME/MN), 1 in Hulne Park on 16th (CMA et al) and 1 near Haltwhistle on 23rd (D. Allen).

Haux ev on 7th, 10th and 24th (HRS).

Hobby: A very tired bird on Holy Island on 8th (MFMM).

Peregrine: A bird trailing jesses at Cresswell on 27th was thought to be of this species (per TH).

Merlin: Only 1 passage bird: a male at Bamburgh on 3rd (BRS).

Coot: On 22nd, 60 at Holywell and 64 at Capheaton (CMA) and 54 at Washington on 27th (BU). 1 seen to drown a Carrion Crow in Gosforth Park on 17th (ABI).

Oystercatcher: Up to 6 at Holywell until 16th (CED et al) and still a flock of 55 near Hauxley on 30th (HRS).

Ringed Plover: Passage took place throughout month, with a distinct peak during fourth week. 40 at Cresswell Pond on 19th (TH/MTR), 252 in Budle Bay (BRS) and 33 at Washington (per BU) on 25th and 10 at Wallsend Swallow on 26th (JDP). Away from breeding sites, also occurred inland at Cramlington, Holywell and Seaton Burn.

Grey Plover: At least 8 at Fenham Mill on 6th - 12th (MFMM/CMA) and 1 at Hauxley on 9th (HRS). 1 at Washington on 29th (SJH).

Turnstone: 1 at Holywell on 9th and 2 on 10th (CED) and still 85 at Annstead on 9th (BRS).

Whimbrel: Between 1 and 4 at Hauxley from 1st - 13th (BMn/HRS), 1 in Budle Bay on 6th (BRS) 3 on Holy Island on 10th and 2 on 11th (MFMM) and 2 N. off St. Mary's on 14th (JDP).

Black-tailed Godwit: 1 at Washington from 10th - 23rd (ERM/RN/BU).

Bar-tailed Godwit: Only 2 records; 1 at Hauxley on 10th (HRS) and 1 in Budle Bay on 16th (BRS).

Green Sandpiper: 1 - 2 at Hauxley from 7th - 9th (HRS). 1 on Holy Island on 8th (MFMM).

Wood Sandpiper: 1 on Holy Island on 8th (MFMM), 1 at Hauxley on 8th - 10th (HRS), 1 at Cresswell on 9th (LGM) and at Washington 2 from 9th - 20th with 7 on 11th (RN et al). 1 at Killingworth on 23rd (GB).

Common Sandpiper: Coastal passage in evidence from 2nd - 11th with up to 3 at Holy Island, Hauxley, Cresswell etc.

Spotted Redshank: 1 at Washington from 4th - 6th and another there on 20th (BU).

Greenshank: 1 in Budle Bay on 2nd - 25th (BRS), 1 at Holywell on 22nd (MN) and 1 at Washington on 9th - 10th (RN/ERM).

Knot: Only 2 records; 13 at Hauxley on 2nd and 2 there on 24th (HRS).

Purple Sandpiper: 6 at Hauxley on 7th (HRS), 5 on Holy Island on 9th (MFMM) and 6 at Seaton Sluice on 25th (GU).

Little Stint: 1 at Cresswell from 15th - 18th (MN/TH) and 1 at Washington on 20th (RN).

<u>Dunlin</u>: 30 at Cresswell on 19th was by far largest group reported (MTR). 7 were well inland at Broomlee Lough on 27th (MR).

Curlew Sandpiper: A bird still in Winter plumage near Hauxley on 9th (MTR). Not often noted in Spring.

Sanderling: Still 97 on Holy Island on 4th (MFMM) and 22 at Hauxley on 7th (HRS).

Ruff: 1 at Washington from 11th - 25th (RN/BU).

Grey Phalarope: A very unusual record of 1 on Holy Island on 8th (per MFMM)

Common Gull: A pair with a nest and 3 eggs in the southern half of Northumberland on 23rd. There are very few records of nesting Common Gulls for the county.

Glaucous Gull: Still quite plentiful with 2 at Hauxley on 2nd and 1 on 31st (HRS), 1 at Cresswell on 2nd (JA.McC), 1 at Druridge on 9th (LGM), 1 at Washington from 5th - 13th (BU et al) and 1 at Annstead on 31st (BRS). All were immatures.

Iceland Gull: A second year bird with the Glaucous at Washington from 10th - 13th (BU) and a probable at Hauxley on 16th (HRS).

<u>Little Gull:</u> At Holy Island Lough 2 on 17th, 5 on 24th and 6 on 30th (BRS). At $^{\rm C}$ resswell 1 on 28th/29th (TH/ERM). All were immatures.

<u>Kittiwake</u>: N. passage of up to 350/hr. noted at Hauxley and Cresswell on 5 dates between 10th and 31st inclusive.

Black Tern: 1 at Holywell on 6th and 17th (CED/MN).

Terns (sp): Moving N. off Hauxley at 150/hr. on 24th (HRS).

Common/Arctic/Roseate: All reported by mid month off the coast.

<u>Little Tern:</u> 1 - 2 at Cresswell on 2nd - 3rd (AB/J & RMcC), 1 at Holy Island on 16th (JKJ) 1 in Budle Bay on 24th - 31st (BRS), 3 at Seaton Sluice on 27th (RFJ), 1 at Newton on 31st (MTR).

Razorbill/Guillemot: Some heavy N. movements off Hauxley with 200 - 250/hr. on 10th, 23rd and 24th (HRS).

Turtle Dove: 2 at Bamburgh on 25th (BRS) and 2 at Washington on 28th (per BU).

Collared Dove: Very prominent on coastal passage at beginning of month as birds were seen arriving from E. Up to 4 daily on Holy Island between 3rd - 16th (MFMM/JKJ), up to 7 at Bamburgh between 1st - 3rd (BRS), 1 0 2 at Hauxley on 9th and 24th (HRS) and up to 6 at Priors Park between 4th - 7th (KGD/MH). 70 at Earsdon on 28th.

Cuckoo: l at Simonside on 1st (GU) after which there was an abundance of records from all over the county.

Short-eared Owl: 1 at Bamburgh on 24th - the only record (BRS).

Long-eared Owl: 1 on Holy Island on 4th (MFMM).

<u>Swift:</u> The first of the Spring were 1 on Holy Island on 4th followed by 1 at Kenton Bar on 5th (BMn) - some 10 days late. By 9th there were several at Holywell and next day they were seen at Gosforth, Derwent Reservoir and Staward. From 13th onwards they became increasingly common over breeding areas throughout Northumberland.

Nightjar: 1 singing in Northumberland Park, North Shields on 17th/18th (MC).

Great Spotted Woodpecker: At least 1 on Holy Island from 4th - 8th (MFMM).

Wryneck: More than are seen in most Autumns. 1 at Priors Park on 4th (KGD), up to 4 at Hauxley between 7th - 11th (HRS), 1 at South Shields on 8th (RA), 1 at Seaton Delaval on 14th (AB) and 1 on Holy Island on 24th (JMB/MB).

Shore Lark: A late record of 7 at Hauxley on 3rd - 5th (HRS).

Hirundines: All 3 species were noted moving steadily N. through both counties throughout month. House Martins seemed particularly prominent towards end when there were 80 in a mixed flock over Gosforth Park on 29th (GB).

Fieldfare: Quite prominent at coast until 17th. Most common on Holy Island where there were 30 on 9th, 50 on 12th and 25 on 16th (MFMM/JKJ). Up to 9 reported almost daily from 5 other points down the coast and 1 inland at Wark on 16th (LGM et al).

Redwing: 3 late birds on Holy Island on 10th (RA/RAK).

Ring Ouzel: Passage birds noted at Holy Island (1 on 1st, 2 on 5th and 1 on 6th), Hauxley (1 on 2nd) and Bamburgh (1 on 16th and 2 on 17th).

Blackbird: 2 young reared from a "nest box" in Kenton by 17th (MRS).

Wheatear: Very conspicuous at the coast during first half of month. 30 on Holy Island on 5th (MFMM) and 100 there by 16th. 10 - 20 in both Bamburgh and Hauxley areas between 2nd - 11th. 1 of the Greenland Race at Seaton Delaval on 14th (AB).

Stonechat: A pair fledged young from a nest near Hauxley (HRS).

Whinchat: First noted on 3rd when singles were at both Cresswell (AB) and Hauxley (HRS). Next day 2 at Cleadon (per BU) and 2 on Holy Island and thereafter became increasingly common all along coast but only in small numbers. 30/40 on Holy Island on 16th was by far the largest count (JKJ et al).

Redstart: Noted amongst the influx of continental birds at beginning of month but only in small numbers. Between 1st - 16th up to 13 on Holy Island (RA/RAK) up to 7 at Bamburgh (BRS), up to 3 at Hauxley and in ones and twos at Seaton Delaval, Whitley Bay and Marsden.

Black Redstart: An unusual number of records for the time of year. At Holy Island 1 on 5th, 1 on 6th, 2 on 10th, 1 on 11th and 1 on 16th (MFMM/JKJ et al). On Farnes 6 on 13th (BL). At Hauxley 1 on 9th and another in Amble on 14th (HRS). Druridge 1 15th/16th (TH).

Blue Throat: 2 on Holy Island on 11th (MFMM), and 5 were on the Farnes on 13th (BL). Single birds that may have been of this species were reported by inexperienced observers at Holywell on 14th and Cresswell on 16th.

Robin: Up to 10 almost daily at Holy Island, Bamburgh and Hauxley between 7th - 17th. Most were very pale and judged to be of continental origin.

Grasshopper Warbler: A spate of records from 2nd onwards from both inland (Gosforth Park, Cramlington and Ryton) and the coast (Holy Island - Cresswell) and perhaps more plentiful than is usual. A seemingly heavy influx occurred on 9th/10th when there were 12 at Bamburgh and up to 20 in the Hauxley area. 1 on the Farnes on 13th (BL).

/Savi's Warbler: A bird heard singing, but not seen, on Holy Island on 4th was thought to have been a Savi's. Notes have been submitted to B.B. (MFMM).

Sedge Warbler: 2 were heard singing in Gosforth Park on 19th April (SJH) but not recorded elsewhere until 1 at Holy Island on 1st followed by 1 at Bamburgh on 2nd and 1 at Hauxley on 3rd. Thereafter became increasingly common with distinct influxes on 9th (14 at each of Hauxley/Bamburgh), and 23rd/26th (45 at Bamburgh and 30 at Hauxley).

<u>Icterine Warbler</u>: 1 trapped at Bamburgh on 26th (BRS) is first Spring record for North-umberland. The first ever record of this species in the county was a bird shot in Jesmond on 20th June 1889 but this should be classed a "Summer sighting".

Blackcap: Prominent, but only in small numbers, on passage at the coast between 2nd and 25th. Counts varied between 1 and 4 at many places between Holy Island and Marsden. Birds were well established inland by mid month with 10 at Hartford on 16th (ABI) and smaller numbers in Jesmond Dene, Seaton Delaval and Gosforth Park.

Barred Warbler: 1 singing at Seaton Delaval on 14th was obviously part of the influx of continental species taking place at that time (AB). Again this is the first Spring record for Northumberland.

Garden Warbler: Surprisingly few records and very late. Several at Hartford on 2nd (AB1) were the first of the Spring. Thereafter 1 - 2 noted from only Holy Island, Bamburgh, Cresswell and Seaton Delaval but a suggestion of an influx on 26th when 8 at Bamburgh (BRS).

Whitethroat: 1 at Holywell on 2nd was first of the Spring (CED) but not really regular throughout Northumberland until after 9th/10th. It is gratifying to see that there are obviously more than in 1969 but numbers are still not up to their normal level.

Lesser Whitethroat: Undoubtedly the bird of the month. It has been an unprecedented Spring for this species with birds appearing all along the coast. On 1st, 1 on Holy Island (MFMM) but no more until 6th when 1 at Tynemouth (KGD/MH) and 1 on Holy Island. By 9th/10th the movement was at its peak with 30 on Holy Island, 38 at Bamburgh, 20 at Hauxley, 10 between Cresswell and Hauxley, and up to 4 at 5 other points. Thereafter numbers slowly fell but still 9 on Holy Island on 17th. Inland 1 - 3 at Seaton Delaval between 7th - 23rd (AB), and on 17th, 1 at each of Gosforth Park and Wooler.

Willow Warbler: 3 distinct influxes noted. On 1st - 3rd up to 110 on Holy Island and 80 at Bamburgh and 1 trapped at Hauxley on 3rd (the peak of the passage), showed distinct characteristics of the N. Race (acredula). On 11th - 16th up to 200 on Holy Island, 16 at Bamburgh and 80 in Holywell Dene and on 26th, 50 at Bamburgh. These records were supported by observations of smaller numbers at other points along coast.

Chiffchaff: Also noted on coastal passage throughout month but in less spectacular numbers than Willow Warbler. The peak occurred on 9th - 11th with 8 - 12 at Hauxley and 10 - 15 in South Shields. A few were also noted on Holy Island and Bamburgh and still 3 at the latter on 30th. 6 singing males at Hartford on 16th (ABI).

Wood Warbler: A few noted in the coastal arrivals. At Bamburgh 1 on 9th, 3 on 10th and 2 on 16th (BRS). At Hauxley 1 on 9th (HRS). Singles also noted at Holywell (B & ME) and Hartford on 16th (AB1).

Goldcrest: Up to 8 noted on Holy Island, at Bamburgh, Craster, Hauxley and Whitley Bay between 7th - 16th, and 20 in Holywell Dene on 9th (JDP et al).

Spotted Flycatcher: 1 at Ryton on 3rd (J & RMcC) and 1 at Seaton Delaval on 7th (AB). On

On 13th, 1 in Holywell Dene and on 16th, 5 on Holy Island and 1 at Bamburgh but not noted with any degree of regularity until after 23rd/26th when a moderate fall was witnessed at Bamburgh (30) with smaller numbers at Hauxley.

Pied Flycatcher: First noted on 7th when 1 at Priors Park (KGD/MH). Next day 4 on Holy Island (MFMM) and on 9th, 6 at Hauxley and 4 at Bamburgh. By 10th, 9 on Holy Island, 2 at Craster and new birds were continually appearing at Hauxley and Bamburgh. The peak of the movement seemed to be over by 12th but on 16th/17th still 6 on Holy Island (JKJ et al) and 2 at Seaton Delaval on 14th (AB). Breeding birds had returned to their haunts at Dipton, Staward and Langleeford after 9th/10th.

Red-breasted Flycatcher: An adult male was present at Hauxley on 7th (HRS) - only the eighth Spring record for the county. We would be well as well

Tree Pipit: On 3rd, 3 at each of Bamburgh and Seaton Delaval and on 3rd - 7th, 1 - 2 on Holy Island. On 8th - 11th up to 10 on Holy Island (MFMM) and Hauxley (HRS), 5 at Bamburgh (BRS), 1 at Whitley Bay (CED) and 2 at Marsden (BU). Also noted inland at Simonside (GU) and Gosforth Park (SJH). From 13th - 16th, 1 - 3 at Bamburgh and Hauxley and 1 at the latter on 24th.

Water Pipit: Full notes taken on 1 at Cresswell on 9th (CW). 7

White Wagtail: On 2nd, 2 at Annstead (BRS) and 4 at Holywell (CED) and 1 at Hauxley next day. On 5th, 1 on Holy Island (MFMM), on 9th, 1 at Cresswell (LGM) and on 23rd, 1 at Holywell (CED).

Yellow Wagtail: Reported from many areas throughout month. Largest counts were 25 - 30 at Annstead on 2nd/3rd (BRS) and 25 at Swallow on 4th (GU).

Grey Headed Wagtail: 1 seen at Cresswell on 9th (ERM) and on 19th a bird at Holywell was either ashy or Grey Headed (CED/MN). / amelier numbers in Jeaner Dene, Seaton Delayal

Blue Headed Wagtail: 1 at Annstead on 2nd/3rd (BRS) and 1 at Cresswell on 9th (ERM).

Red Backed Shrike: A male on Holy Island on 12th and possibly the same bird there on 17th on 17th (CAM/JMB). Also male on Farnes on 13th (BL).

Woodchat Shrike: An adult watched for six hours at Priors Park, Tynemouth on 17th (KGD/MH) This will be third record for the county. 7

Hawfinch: 1 at Ryton on 7th (J & RMcC) and 1 found dead at Hartford on 30th (AB1).

Goldfinch: Parties of up to 11 noted from both inland and at the coast.

Siskin: 1 at Wark on 27th (ERM).

Scarlet Grosbeak: A male trapped and ringed at Bamburgh on 9th (BRS).

Crossbill: Family party of 5 near Wark on 28th (ERM).

Brambling: On Holy Island 1 on 3rd and again on 16th (MFMM/JKJ). 1 at Priors Park on 8th (MH/KGD).

Lapland Bunting: A male on the Farnes on 13th (BL).

TYNESIDE BIRD CLUB

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SUMMARY.

June was a very warm, dry month and like May was dominated by winds from an easterly quarter.

Apart from low water levels affecting the nesting success of Great Crested Grebes, most species seemed to have enjoyed a successful breeding season during the very settled weather

With a S.E. airstream covering most of W. Europe from 2nd - 10th rare migrants were still appearing in coastal areas. A Whiskered Tern made a brief stop on 7th/8th, an Avocet appeared and remained for 16 days and 2 Black Terns were seen.

A deep depression to the W. of Britain from 11th - 13th was possible the reason for the appearance of a few Skuas offshore on 14th but settled weather returned until about 24th when a Spoonbill was seen and the Avocet disappeared.

The last few days, with another low pressure centre to the W. of Britain, seemed to bring a slight influx of waders, particularly Curlew and Oystercatcher, and a flock of 16 Black Tailed Godwits was seen.

Other interesting species recorded during the month were last month's Blue Winged Teal, Garganey, breeding success of both Gadwall and Little Ringed Plover, Osprey, Quail, Spotted Redshank and a possible Scarlet Grosbeak.

SUMMARY.

July was predominantly an unsettled month with winds, of varying strength, blowing from a westerly quarter as a series of depressions tracked across the country.

There were few days on which conditions were favourable for grounding passage birds and with the exception of a peak movement of Common Sandpipers and Dunlin in mid-month we had to wait until after 25th before waders and passerines became at all conspicuous. It was also about this time that Manx Shearwaters were seen moving N. together with 1 Sooty Shearwater and reasonable numbers of Gannets, Fulmars and Kittiwakes. Two Glaucous Gulls and an adult Little Gull also appeared and an early Red-necked Grebe was seen.

On 31st, after a few days of more settled weather followed by 2 cloud fronts, associated with a small depression, crossing S. Scotland, a heavy influx of Sedge Warblers was noted at one coastal locality. Perhaps these had been forced down at the coast after crossing the country on the clear nights of 29th/30th.

Other interesting records included a Black-necked Grebe, the Kielder Osprey, another breeding record of Little Ringed Plover, summering of Little Gulls, successful nesting of Kingfisher and a Hawfinch.

Early August has been rather quiet with a continued lack of records of the traditional waders but on 16th an early Barred Warbler was trapped at Hauxley so next month's bulletin may be a little more interesting.

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

SUMMARY. ovresed trewred , (br89 - dr0 mori 8-7)

During the first 15 days of the month conditions were generally quite settled as High Pressure centres over Scandanavia and the Azores dominated the weather, but storms over the Low Countries on 7th/6th may have been responsible for the appearance of 3 Red Crested Pochard on 9th.

On 16th a depression centres in the Irish Sea resulted in strong SE winds and rain grounding a few continental migrants at the coast. Waders also became more numerous and sea birds were noted moving N. offshore. By 19th High Pressure began to intensify over Scandanavia and with another shallower depression stationary over S. England more passerines and waders were grounded on their way S. Numbers were not really high but as a cloud front moved S. over the North Sea on 22nd - 23rd unusual numbers of Wrynecks appeared with a few Chats, Warblers (including Icterine, Barred and Greenish), Flycatchers Red-backed Shrikes and Ortolan Buntings. Wader numbers were at their highest about this time (e.g. Lapwing) and sea birds (including Sooty Shearwaters and Great Skuas) were still prominent moving N.

More settled weather returned on 25th and during the subsequent week 'redirected' birds (i.e. those that had made landfall farther N.) were noted moving S. through the area.

Other unusual species recorded were Black-necked Grebe, Little Ringed Plover, Jack Snipe, Little Stints and Curlew Sandpipers, possible Termincks Stints, and Hawfinch.

Noted moving S. over the coastal strip on most days with a total of 67 during 17 days at Hauxley. A distinct peak was noted between 1st and 5th when 35 flew S. over Fenham Flats, 13 over Cresswell, 33 over Seaton Sluice and 4 over Whitburn (JKJ/BMn/RA).

Bar-tailed Godwit:-

Up to 4 noted at 6 points between Holy Island and Whitburn.

Green Sandpiper:-

Noted at many places in parties of up to 3 as far inland as Whittle Dene. Holywell Ponds regularly had up to 4, with 5 on 7th (MN et al). Following a heavy rain shower on 15th a flock of 7 was near the lake at Killingworth (FC).

Wood Sandpiper:-

A less plentiful species than the former but ones and twos noted at 6 different localities throughout month. 6 at Cresswell Pond on 21st (TH et al).

Common Sandpiper:-

Parties of up to 4 from many waters. The largest gatherings were at the beginning of month with cl0 at Chevington from 1st - 10th (HRS), and 15 at Derwent Reservoir on 4th (MR) but still 12 at Alnmouth on 31st (LCM/RN).

Redshank: -

500 in Budle Bay on 2nd (B & ME), 50 on Coquet Estuary on 9th (HRS) increasing to 210 on 31st (LGM) when 1600 at Alnmouth.

Spotted Redshank:-

No records until 14th when 2 at Washington (RN) and next day 1 on Holy Island (J & RMcC) and 1 S. at St. Mary's (AT). 2 were at Whittle Dene on 16th where they increased to 8 by 31st (IHA/MR et al) and on 17th, 1 near Annitsford. On 21st, 1 at Holy Island, Chevington and Cresswell and next day 2 at Holywell. 4 were at Swallow on 26th and Washington had a max. of 4 on 16th. 4 in Budle Bay on 29th.

Greenshank: -

Ones and twos at many of the usual ponds during month as far inland as Colt Crag, but generally scarcer than it has been for some years. Largest numbers were at Budle Bay (7 on 22nd - 29th), Whittle Dene 6 on 24th) and Washington (5 on 16th).

Little Stint: -

An unusual number of records. First noted on 17th when 2 at Washington, (rising to a maximum of 8 on 22nd) on 20th, 1 appeared at Whittle Dene (1 - 2 seen until 30th), on 21st - 23rd 5/6 on Holy Island, on 22nd - 31st 3/4 at Cresswell, on 25th/26th 1 - 2 at Woodhorn and from 25th - 28th 1 - 2 at Holywell.

Dunlin: -

Up to 50 at many points on the coast. Inland maxima were, at Whittle Dene 39 on 23rd, (IHA/MR et al) at Holywell 25 on 28th (CED et al) and at Washington 40 on 19th (BU).

Curlew Sandpiper:-

First noted on 16th when 8 at Boulmer and 2 at Cresswell (JCF). On 20th 1 at Hauxley (HRS) and another 2 three on 22nd/24th. Also on 22nd, 1 in Budle Bay (BRS) and 2 at Holywell (AT) whilst on 23rd, 6 at Whittle Dene (IHA/MR), 1 at Washington (BU) and 1 at Woodhorn (JKJ). Up to 7 at Swallow 23rd 27th and up to 4 at Whittle Dene 24th 31st. Max. of 5 at S. Linton 25th 31st (GU et al), 8 in Budle Bay 25th/26th when 1 at Cramlington.

Song Thrush:Conscpicuous at Hauxley during influx of migrants on 23rd (HRS).

Ring Ouzel:- A remarkable record of 1 in a Wallsend Shipyard on 6th (IHA).

Blackbird: - A third brood of 3 young fledged from a nest in Gosforth by 14th (MRS). The nest was on top of a bay window!

Wheatear:A moderate arrival on 22nd/23rd with 10 - 20 at Hauxley and 30+ between Seaton Sluice and St. Mary's (ABl et al).

Stonechat:Pair bred successfully at Bamburgh (BRS).

Whinchat:Involved in the general arrival of 22nd/23rd with up to 30 at Hauxley (HRS) and smaller numbers at Bamburgh and St. Mary's. Again 30 at Hauxley on 28th/29th when a light influx noted at Bamburgh.

Redstart:An early migrant at Hauxley on 2nd (HRS) and another at Druridge on 16th (RA et al).
Between 21st - 31st 1 on Holy Island, 1 - 2 at Bamburgh, 3 - 4 at Hauxley and 1 at Blyth.

Robin:A few arrived during general influx of 22nd - 30th. 7 new birds trapped at Hauxley.

Grasshopper Warbler:1 on Holy Island on 16th and 22nd (J & RMcC), 1 at Bamburgh on 15th and 21st (BRS) and 1 at Hauxley on 20th (HRS).

Reed Warbler:l near Hauxley on 22nd (HRS).

Sedge Warbler:As reported last month 4 - 500 at Chevington on 1st constituted a very heavy influx (HRS).

<u>Single Hippolais</u> almost certainly of this species at St. Mary's on 21st (JKJ). At Druridge from 22nd - 25th (TH et al) and at Hauxley on 22nd - 23rd (HRS).

Blackcap:1 - 2 at Bemburgh from 20th - 23rd (BRS) and at Hauxley single new birds trapped on 2rd and 15th (HRS).

Barred Warbler: Reported only from Hauxley where 1 trapped on 16th and a further 3 trapped between 23rd 30th (HRS).

Garden Warbler:
Between 8th - 21st, 6 singles trapped at Hauxley and a max. of 15+ present between 22nd - 24th (HRS). 10 on Holy Island on 23rd (J & RMcC) and up to 4 at each of Bamburgh,

Druridge and St. Mary's between 20th - 22nd.

Whitethroat:-Up to 4 at each of Holy Island, Bamburgh and Hauxley between 21st - 29th.

Lesser Whitethroat:2 on Holy Island (J & RMcC) and 3 in Budle Bay (BRS) on 22nd. Between 20th - 27th at least 3 at Hauxley (HRS). 1 at Ovingham on 21st (RTG).

Willow Warbler:- c50 in Hauxley area on 5th and further influxes noted on 15th (30) and 22nd/23rd (c25) Up to 10 at each of Bamburgh and Whitley Bay between 21st - 25th. A suggestion of large numbers inland at Ovingham on 17th (RTG).

Greenish Warbler:-Full notes taken on 1 trapped at Bamburgh on 22nd - the third there since 1965 (BRS).

Chiffchaff: - 178
Only 1 record. 1 at Bamburgh on 23rd (BRS).

Spotted Flycatcher: Only a few - at Duridge/Hauxley - in the influx of 22nd/24th.

Pied Flycatcher:An unusual record of 1 in Denton Burn on 5th (BG). Prominent at the coast after 16th particularly 22nd/23rd when c20 on Holy Island (J & RMcC), 12 at Hauxley (HRS), 20 at Blyth Cemetery (CED) and 10 at Marsden (BU/RA). Smaller numbers at Bamburgh and Seaton Sluice Area.

Tree Pipit:1 at Chevington on 1st (HRS), 1 at Blyth Cemetery on 23rd (CED) and 3 at Bamburgh on 25th (BRS).

Grey Wagtail:1 - 3 at Bamburgh on 29th/30th and 1 at Hauxley on 29th.

Red-backed Shrike:Single juveniles at Hauxley from 23rd - 28th (HRS) and at Bamburgh on 24th/25th (BRS).

TYNESIDE BIRD CLUB

SEPTEMBER 1970 BULLETIN

SUMMARY

Westerly weather dominated September and it was not until the last few days that there was any appreciable abatement in the strong winds. The appearance of American Waders seemed inevitable and sure enough 2, possibly 3, Pectoral Sandpipers were seen as well as a possible Bairds Sandpiper. Another Pectoral turned up in early October when a Buff Breasted Sandpiper was seen on Holy Island.

Waders in general were in good numbers and the draining of the N. reservoir at Whittle Dene illustrated how attractive the area could be if there was a permanent area of suitable feeding. Species recorded there included Grey Plover, Bar-tailed Godwit, Temmincks and Little Stints and Curlew Sandpiper. In fact the latter 2 species were particularly prominent at the coast after about 8th with birds remaining until early October at least.

The gales also drove a Manx Shearwater inland on 9th and 3 Pomarines were seen during the month. On 1st, a possible Whiskered Tern was reported and from 12th - 17th a Marsh Harrier frequented the Northumbrian Loughs. It was about mid month that Wigeon were moving N. in large numbers and about the same time 2 early flocks of Brent Geese were reported.

Passerines were not really in evidence until the last few days of the month as High Pressure over N. Europe began to exert its influence and it was during this brief spell that 3 species of shrike, Icterine and Barred Warblers and a probable Tawny Pipit appeared.

As the month closed a Chilean Flamingo visited Derwent Reservoir for over a week but the bird was almost certainly an escape from captivity.

TYNESIDE BIRD CLUB

OCTOBER 1970 BULLETIN

SUMMARY

With the exception of the periods 10 - 17 and 20 - 22, October was dominated by westerly to north westerly weather as a series of depressions moved eastwards across N. Scotland.

Conditions were thus rarely favourable for the migration of passerines from the Continent. Even the small flush that occurred between 10 - 17, as high pressure became established over Denmark, was nowhere near the scale we are sometimes used to in October but the light SSE winds did bring Redwings, Ring Ouzels, Blackbirds, 2 Black Redstarts, 2 Reed Warblers, Blackcaps, a Yellow Browed Warbler, 2 Great Grey Shrikes and Bramblings. The generally settled weather on the Continent at that time however allowed migration of Turdidae, Robins and Goldcrests to S. Europe proceed unhindered.

Northerly gales on 20/21 resulted in an interesting movement of sea birds, particularly as the storms abated. Divers, Ducks, Gulls and Pomarine Skuas were very much in evidence and a possible Booby (sp) was seen off St. Mary's. Within a week of the gales, which affected much of the N. European sea board, 3 Grey Phalaropes were seen together and both Geese and Whooper Swans became more numerous.

Early in month a few Shearwaters were moving N. and both Pectoral and Buff Breasted Sandpipers were reported. Little Stints and Curlew Sondpiper continued to move through coastal
districts and in mid month a possible Ferruginuous Duck appeared. Despite the apparent
adverse weather conditions, the last week of the month was not without interest as the firs
waxwings arrived, being the forerunners of a heavy invasion early in November, and as well
as a possible Temmincks Stint both Woodchat and Great Grey Shrikes were reported.

Altogether an interesting month.

Heron:

SUMMARY

With respect to visible migration, the most significant period of the month was 7th/8th, when during rather cold weather with moderate ENE winds both sea birds and migrating passerines were very much in evidence. Off several points on the coast Divers, Ducks, 3 species of Skua, Little Gulls, Kittiwakes and Auks were observed moving N. in numbers whilst 3 immigrant Long-eared Owls were seen together with 1 (possible 2) Eastern Chiffchaffs and a Yellow browed Warbler. The 10th brought a Hobby and a Rough-legged Buzzard but westerly weather for the remainder of month curtailed any obvious immigration from the Continent.

The Club wildfowl count on 22nd produced some very omteresting and valuable results with large numbers of Mallard, Wigeon, Whooper Swans and Grey Lag Geese and it seemed that all members who participated had a very enjoyable day.

Other more unusual species reported during the month were Black-necked Grebe, Bewicks Ewans. Shore Larks, Great Grey Shrike and Lapland Bunting and as well as being a Waxwing year it seems that unusual numbers of Twite have visited Northumberland. Keep your eyes open as there were still some present early in December.

Max. counts in excess of 150 were - 1000 in Budle Bay on 22nd (BG/JEO et al), 1000 at Colt Crag for most of month (CW/IHA et al), 660 at Gosforth on 8th (CW), 510 at Derwent on 22nd (RN) 400 at Capheaton on 14th (ERM), 200 at Sweethope on 22nd (IHA) and 200 at Whittle Dene on 29th (J & RMcC). A light N. movement noted off Annstead and Hauxley on 7th/8th with up to 50 per day.

Again some large counts and many flocks of up to 70. Largest numbers were at Holywell (max. 220 on 15th), Gosforth (250 on 22nd), Holburn Moss (400 on 14th) and Budle Bay (360 on 21st).

Some 60 stretches of water, divided into 12 groups, were covered by a total of about 40 members and included all of the major areas in Northumberland, N. Durham and 2 lakes (Yetholm and Hoselaw) just over the Scottish border in the North West.

Coastal coverage (between Holy Island and St. Mary's Island) was also attempted with moderate success considering the enormous tasks for the few people involved.

Species omitted from the table because of lack of space were as follows :-

Single R.N. Grebes at Holy Island and Alnmouth, a G.C. Grebe at Holy Island, Little Grebes Grindon (1) and Lynemouth (2), 4 Gadwall at Budle Bay, 3 Scaup at Holy Island, 1 Smew at Hoselaw and 1 Barnacle Goose at Colt Crag.

Of the 53 <u>Divers</u> recorded single $\underline{G.N.}$ and $\underline{B.T.}$ <u>Divers</u> were noted off Holy Island and Bamburgh respectively.

The waters that drew a blank were Ryal, Linnheads, Little Swinburn, Killingworth, Hisehope and Burnhope. Tunstall produced 1 Goosander while Lilburn, Fenton and Pawston had an aggregate total of 200 Mallard, 65 Teal, 50 Wigeon, 3 Tufted, 2 Pochard, 2 Mute Swan and 22 Coot. Holborn Moss was not covered on the actual day but on 15th November there were 250 Mallard, 160 Teal, 1500 Wigeon, 14 Pintail, 5 Tufted Duck, 3 Goldeneye, 430 Grey Lags, 3 Pink Feet and 4 Bewicks Swans whilst on 21st 7 White Fronts were seen on the Lindisfarne Reserve.

It is proposed to conduct another count, perhaps on an even larger scale, in late February 1971 to obtain a comparison with the current observations. Numbers of Tufted, Pochard, Goldeneye and Goosander should have increased by then but it will be interesting to note whether the current large numbers of Mallard, Teal, Wigeon, Whooper Swan and Grey Lag Goose will be maintained.

As a final comment both the field secretary and the recorder would like to thank everyone who participated and hope that at least as many members will turn out in February.

DECEMBER 1970 BULLETIN

SUMMARY

The appearance of an immature Ivory Gull and an adult Ross's Gull at the mouth of the Tyne on the 18th and 24th respectively were undoubtedly the highlights of the month.

Close views were obtained of both species on each side of the river and although the Ross's has not been seen since the turn of the year, the Ivory was still present on 16th January. One can only speculate as to how they ever reached us but strong N. winds blowing directly from the Arctic pack ice on 2nd/3rd and again on 22nd may have been responsible.

The cold Northerly airstream, combined with rough conditions in the North Sea between 22nd - 31st forced many seabirds close to the shore and large numbers of Divers, Fulmars and Ducks were moving N. 3 species of Skua were also noted together with a few Little Aut and some small parties of waders.

Of the many other interesting records received 2 lots of White Fronted Geese, a possible Gyr Falcon, a Black Tailed Godwit, a Grey Phalarope, an Iceland Gull, a Mediterranean Gull, an exceptionally late Swallow and a large flock of Snow Buntings all deserve special mention.

Early January has not been without interest. A Crane appeared at Alnmouth on 9th and was still present on 17th and the general feeling amongst those who have seen it is that it is not an escape from captivity.

Black-throated Diver:

An unusual number off St. Mary's where 4 S. on 5th/6th and 12 N. between 24th - 28th (JDP). 1 at Bamburgh on 6th (BRS) and 1 off Holy Island on 28th (AJR).

Great Northern Diver:

Off Holy Island up to 4 between 25th - 30th (LGM/ERM/RN et al). Off St. Mary's 1 S. on 6th and 3 S. on 27th/28th (JDP).

Red-throated Diver:Up to 4 off 7 different points on coast during month. A heavy N. movement between 24th 30th; e.g. 43 N. in 2 hours off St. Mary's on 24th (JDP) and 16 N. off Cresswell in halfan-hour on 30th (BG/ERM).

Great Crested Grebe:
1 off Holy Island on 26th and 30th (ERM/BU).

Teal:
On 3rd, 200+ at Gosforth (MRS) on 4th, 110 on Holy Island (until 28th), on 5th, 130 at Holywell (CED), on 6th, 200 in Budle Bay (BRS), on 26th, cl00 at Holburn Moss (ETM).
