An interesting month in which the appearance of a Crane and the continued stay of the Ivory Gull were the most exciting events.

Winter.

Because of the postal strike the Met. Office weather charts were not available for consultation but it did not seem to be cold weather that was responsible for an apparent movement of Little Grebes, Bewicks Swans, Coots, Lapwings, Golden Plover, and Snipe between 9th and 17th, and it was also on 9th that the Crane was first seen.

A light influx of Short-eared Owls was noted towards end of month and on 31st unusual numbers of Fulmars and Gannets were moving off-shore.

Duck numbers were remarkably high, particularly Mallard, Teal and Tufted Duck and Gosforth Park held almost 1800 waterfowl towards end of month.

Three records of Smew in the same month could be unprecedented, particularly when 3 birds found together, and Brent Geese reached their Winter maximum at Fenham Flats in mid-month.

Other interesting species included Black-necked Grebe, Bittern, Spotted Redshank, Great Grey Shrike and of course Waxwings and Twite. A Kent of the Angle Special Spec

Coldeneye: -The River Tweed produced highest concentration with 65 at Berwick on 3rd (ERM). 30 were at Broomlee on 16th (LGM), 19 at Derwent on 9th (RN), max. 18 at Whittle Dene on 10th (J & RMcC) and 15 at Capheaton on 17th (CMA). Up to 12 noted at many other waters.

Long-tailed Duck:-Max. of 8 off Bamburgh on 24th (BRS) and 6 off Holy Island on 31st (RA/RAK). A single bird off Amble on 16th and an unusually hea

Velvet Scoter:-1 off Ross on 23rd (BRS) was only record.

Common Scoter:-Max. of 55 off Bamburgh on 23rd (BRS).

Red-breasted Merganser:Up to 5 noted off Holy Island, Bamburgh and St. Mary's during month.

Goosander:Max. counts were 41 at Derwent on 9th (RN), 36 at Whittle Dene on 10th (J & RMcC), 27 at Greenlee on 9th (LGM), 24 at Colt Crag on 24th (AJR) and 17 on Tyne near Hexham on 3rd and 23rd. Up to 10 noted at several other waters including River Aln at Alnmouth.

Present at Whittle Dene all month with max. of 3 (all 'redheads') between 20th - 30th (LCM/CM. et al). A 'redhead' was also at Greenlee on 16th and a drake was in Budle Bay next day (LCM).

Shelduck:Budle Bay/Fenham Flats contained a max. of 512 on 17th (LGM). 1 at Holywell Pond and 5 off Seaton Sluice on 7th were unusual (B & ME).

Grey Lag Goose:65 at Hoselaw Loch on 17th (MN/CW) and a max. of 56 on Budle Bay on 24th/25th (BRS). Up to 56 in the Grindon area for most of month (LGM/WGJ) and 1 at Alnmouth on 10th (ERM).

Pink-footed Goose:46 in Budle Bay on 17th (LGM).

Brent Goose:400 on Fenham Flats for most of month with a max. of 800 - 1000 on 15th (BM et al).

Mute Swan: - On 3rd, 60 at Beal and 43 at Berwick (ERM).

Whooper Swan:The largest numbers were present at beginning of month. On 3rd, max. 71 on the Holy
Island area and 76 in Coldstream - Norham area and it was on 1st that a max. of 39 was at
Holywell. On 9th, 38 were on the Northumberland Loughs in the west. 21 at Linton on
29th (CA) was only other count in excess of 15.

Bewicks Swan:More records than is usual. On 1st, 5 on Fenham Flats (LGM), on 9th/10th, 5 at Monks
House, Seahouses (MLH/BRS), on 15th, 2 on Holy Island (BM) and on 24th, 7 in Budle Bay
(BRS). Between 9th - 24th, 7 in Cresswell - Linton area (CMA/J & RMcC/ERM) and on 9th, 15
at Holywell Ponds (CED).

Sparrow Hawk: - Singles reported from Alnmouth, Ponteland and Havannah.

Hen Harrier: - - 11 for viewi A male in Kielder Forest on 24th (ERM).

Merlin:Singles in Holy Island, Fenham Flats, Ross and Budle Bay areas and also at Alnmouth and Cresswell between 1st - 24th.

Red Grouse: Very common on Allendale fells early in month (ERM).

Common Crane:
A single, strong-flying bird provided many observers with excellent views as it remained in fields to S. of Alnmouth from 9th until at least 23rd (ERM et al).

 Coot:Max. counts were, at Holywell 65 on 17th and 23rd (CED) and at Broomlee 56 on 16th (LAM).
More unusual records involved 10 in Berwick Harbour on 3rd (ERM), 13 in Budle Bay on 17th (LGM), 1 at Holy Island causeway on 15th, 25 in Amble Harbour on 9th (J & RMcC) and 9 on Quarry Pond, Whitley Bay on same day (JDMcE). Very few in Bolam/Capheaton areas on 17th (CMA).

Lapwing: Some large flocks, with 1000 at Whittle Dene on 10th and 17th and at Holywell on 29th (JSB/FC). 1500 at Holy Island on 15th (BM) and 600 at Pegswood on 17th (ERM).

Grey Plover:3 at each of Cresswell on 10th and at Hauxley on 17th (ERM). 1 at Ross on 10th (MLH/DI).

Golden Plover:1000-1200 at Whittle Dene between 10th - 17th (JSB/J & RMcC et al), 150 at Fenhem Le Moor on 10th and 200 at Hauxley on 17th (MLH/DL).

Curlew: - 55 at Holy Island on 3rd was largest reported flock (ERM).

Woodcock:l at Holywell Ponds on lst (CED).

Common Snipe:An apparent influx noted at Holywell on 16th with at least 55 present (CED) and 45 at Alnmouth next day (BG).

Jack Snipe: - On 17th, 1 in Budle Bay (LGM) and 2 at Alnmouth (ERM).

Green Sandpiper:1 at Whittle Dene all month (LGM/J & RMcC et al).

Spotted Redshank: 1 again seen in Seahouses/Budle Bay area on 9th and 17th (BRS/LGM).

Knot:- At least 1000 at St. Mary's by 29th (B & ME). On 9th, 250 on Coquet Island (ERM) and 90 in Amble Harbour (J & RMcC) and on 31st, 60 at Newton (RA/RAK).

Sanderling: - 60 at Whitburn on 31st was an unusual number for that area (BU).

The B.T.O. Ornithological Atlas Project is now entering the fourth of its five years. At the end of three seasons about 91 per cent of the 10 Km. squares in England, 85 per cent of those in Wales and 66 per cent of those in the Republic of Ireland have been well covered. However 59 per cent of those on Northern Ireland and 66 per cent of those in Scotland are still virtually untouched and much work remains to be done there. Club perbers who intend visiting other parts of the country during the Summer are reminded that tremendous amount of information can be collected (and indeed, has been collected) from casual visits to unfamiliar localities. Any person requiring information on the project should contact me at the next Club Meeting.

Turning now to our local contribution to the project, it is very encouraging to record that of a total of 70 10 Km. squares in Northumberland additional information to 68 of those squares was obtained in 1970. The number of squares with over 50 species recorded now stands at 54 - but there is still much work to be done and offers to cover specific areas or assist on a casual basis are still required for this coming breeding season. Owing to a misunderstanding in the size of maps to be incorporated in the Club's Breeding Survey Report 1967 - 68 publication has had to be postponed although by the time this article appears, more encouraging news should be to hand. However one of the results of the Survey was the absence of confirmed breeding of the Rock Pipit on the Northumberland Coastline.

In order to investigate the matter more thoroughly it is proposed to carry out a specific enquiry into the breeding status of the Rock Pipit in Northumberland and if possible, into North Durham, during 1971.

The criteria for determining breeding will be those adopted in the B.T.O. Atlas Project but the Survey is primarily aimed at assessing numbers of breeding (and if possible nonbreeding) pairs and observers are invited to cover specific stretches of the coastline. Full details will be given at the next Club Meeting and all interested members should contact me then or at home (28 FOX AND HOUNDS ROAD, FENHAM, NEWCASTLE UPON TYNE 5 TEL. 36089). The project will, if necessary, be extended into 1972.

FEBRUARY 1971 BULLETIN

SUMMARY

Comments and

February was comparatively mild and such settled conditions were probably responsible for the early disappearance of many Divers and some of the wintering flocks of surface feeding ducks. Diving ducks, probably on return passage through the area, showed a significant increase between 11th - 14th, particularly Goldeneye and Goosander, and inland Shelducks were probably on return passage westward after completing their moult.

Waders also appeared to be moving after mid-month, particularly Lapwings, Golden Plover and Curlew, and by 21st small numbers of Thrushes and Skylarks seemed to be migrating.

The second Club waterfowl count of the Winter was conducted on 21st and some interesting results were obtained, particularly in the Tweed Valley. The detailed results are summarised in a separate table at the end of the report.

Ivory Gull, Bittern, 4 Smew, Greenshank and 50 - 60 Twite were amongst the more unusual sightings in a rather quiet month.

Heron:Meny records of up to 4 from widely scattered localities.

Bittern:
1 at Holywell Ponds until at least 25th (CED/MH) and 2 may have been present on 6th (per CED).

Mallard:

A significant reduction since last month with maximum counts as follows:- 600 at Derwent on 14th (BG), 300 in Budle Bay on 6th (BRS), 250 at Whittle Dene on 7th (IHA) and also in Druridge Bay on 27th (BMn), 200 off St. Mary's on 4th and 22nd (B & ME) and in Gosforth Park on 20th (ERM), 155 at Holywell on 6th (CED) and 119 off Sunderland on 23rd (BU). Up to 100 at many other waters. (See also separate table for 21st). The 2 white birds at Colt Crag in December 1970 were again seen at Sweethope on 13th (RN).

/Teal

Teal:

A similar reduction noted. 70 at Linton on 28th (RN) was largest flock reported but 40 - 60 were noted at Grindon, Gosforth and Holywell. (See also separate table for 21st).

Wigeon:

The expected decline was not so obvious with 1500 - 1600 still in Budle Bay between 6th - 20th (BRS), 250 at Derwent on 18th (RG/EL), 123 at Grindon on 20th (J & R McC) and 100 at Holywell on 6th (CED) and 300 just over the border at Hoselaw on 14th (AJR). (Also see table for 21st).

Pintail:

Outside 21st (see table) only record was of 3 in Budle Bay on 6th (BRS).

Shoveler:

Single pairs at S. Linton on 14th (EKM) and at Gosforth on 20th (IHA) and 5 at Hoselaw on 14th (AJR). (Also refer to table for 21st).

Scaup:

A pair in Amble harbour on 7th and female remaining until 28th (J & RMcC et al). l at Middleton Hall on 6th (JMB).

Tufted Duck:

Still some sizeable flocks present although none greater than that of 100 at Holywell on 3rd (B & ME). Other counts in excess of 50 were 60 at Hartburn on 11th - 13th (RN et al) and 60 at Gosforth on 27th (FC). See also table for 21st.

Pochard:

Little change since January although 100 were at Gosforth on 27th (FC). Counts in excess of 25 were received from Capheaton (45 on 14th) and Holywell (30 on 15th and 28th) as well as Gosforth. An unusual record of a drake in Amble Harbour on 7th (J & RMcC et al). See also table for 21st.

Goldeneye:

Outside 21st (see table) largest gatherings were; 30 at Derwent on 14th (BG), 28 at Broomlee on 13th (LGM) and 20 at each of Whittle Dene and Hartburn on the same day (RN), and 12 at Capheaton on 14th (ERM). Up to 10 at many other waters, including a few offshore.

Long-tailed Duck:

On 21st, 20 off Ross (BG et al) and 2 off Hauxley (HRS).

Red-breasted Merganser:

2 - 6 in Alnmouth and Holy Island areas during month but see table for 21st. An unusual record of 1, a drake, at Derwent Reservoir on 14th (BG) - see also 1970.

Goosander:

Traditionally the best month of the year for flocking on the rivers, ponds and reservoirs. Maximum counts were 50 at Derwent on 14th (BG), 41 at Whittle Dene on 11th (B & ME), 25 at Wingates on 14th (LGM/ERM), 12 on the Aln at Alnmouth on 28th (RN), 15 at Greenlee on 6th (LGM), and 10 on Tyne at Prudhoe on 10th (AJR). Up to 9 at several other waters including 5 N. off Alnmouth on 7th (BG/ERM). See also table for 21st.

Smew:

3 were again at Whittle Dene, this time for most of month, although on 7th, 4 were seen together and all 'redheads' (PK et al). The 'redhead' that was on the Northumbrian Loughs for most of month (LGM) may have temporarily joined the resident 3 at Whittle Dene on 7th Also 1 at Witton Le Wear on 14th (MR).

Shelduck:

Away from Fenham Flats/Budle Bay area, interesting records were received from Grindon (2 on 2nd), Sweethope (2 on 11th) and Derwent (5 on 27th). These, together with 5 S. off Whitburn on 20th and 9 N. there on 27th, were probably on return migration after moult.

Grey Geese:
An unidentified flock of 30 or more was at Grindon on 22nd (RG/WB/EL).

Grey Lag Goose:
On 12th, 60 - 70 flew NW over Newcastle (BG/MR & ELS), on 13th/14th, 50 were at

On 25th visible migration was noted over Kielder area (ERM).

Grey Plover:

Tyneside Bird Club

Wildfowl Count - 21st February, 1971

Again most of the important waters in Northumberland and North Durham were covered but it is to be regretted that such waters as Capheaton and Bolam Lakes and Lilburn Pond could not be covered. Less effective cover of the coastline was also a pity but these disappointments were largely offset by the very considerable coverage of the River Tweed that was managed together with records from the River Tyne at Hexham and Blaydon.

Wildfowl numbers generally were disappointingly low presumably as a result of the mild weather with Mallard, Wigeon, Eider and Common Scoter numbers well below normal. On the other hand healthy numbers of Tufted Duck, Goldeneye, Goosander and Grey Lag Geese were recorded.

Species omitted from the table because of lack of space were as follows:-

Slavonian Grebe (6) Red Necked Grebe (1) and Pintail (6) all from Lindisfarne Reserve. Gadwall (1) at Grindon Lough.

The waters that drew a blank were Tunstall, Hisehope, Havannah, Linn Heads, Little Swinburn and Cowey Sike. <u>Killingworth</u> had 4 Mute Swans, <u>Waskerley</u> 8 Goosander, <u>Smiddyshaw</u> 2 Mallard and <u>Burnhope</u> 5 Goosander.

Few Clubs can boast such comprehensive coverage of the waters in a County the size of Northumberland (with North Durham as well) and it would be of obvious ornithological importance to be able to make these counts a regular feature every year. A further November count should certainly be attempted.

As a final comment the field secretary and recorder would like to thank all those members who took part.

MARCH 1971 BULLETIN

SUMMARY

Although the month was generally mild, several periods of northerly winds delayed the arrival of the early Summer visitors and by end of month only Ring Ouzel and Wheatear had been recorded, although 2 Arctic Skuas on 29th were remarkably early. Lesser Black Backs were also noted, with increasing frequency, after 7th.

Migration of wildfowl and waders seemed to proceed throughout month with no really distinguished, but Grebes seemed to increase inland after about 14th with a peak during last few days.

Thrushes, Waxwings and Bramblings, the latter in larger numbers than have been seen all Winter, moved steadily through, with Waxwings showing an increase after 21st. Two Siskin flocks may also have been part of a large scale movement through the area on their way to the Continent.

Other interesting records included 2 Mediterranean Gulls, 3 Shore Larks, 2 Great Grey Shrikes, and the Holy Island Twites.

Early April has seen the appearance of a few more Great Grey Shrikes and 2 Lapland Buntings and by 17th Garganey, Sandwich Tern, all 3 hirundines, Willow Warbler, Chiffchaff and Redstart had all been recorded. More about these next month.

Inland records involved 8 - 9 at Wallsend Swallow for most of month (JDMcE et al) and 2 at Seaton Burn on 27th (IK/RO). 8 were also on Cresswell Pond on several occasions and feeding birds on Tweed were seen as far as 16 miles inland at Carham (LGM). At coast, a steady N. movement was noted off Whitburn between 1st - 20th in flocks of up to 29 (BU).

/Shag

Shag: 2 at Wallsend Swallow on 16th were most unusual (JDMcE).

Heron:
11 records of 1 - 3 birds, most of which were probably on passage. A colony in central
Northumberland contained about 25 pairs on 30th.

Mallard: Numbers continued to decline. 120 at Holywell on 14th (CED) and 105 at Derwent on 13th (RN) were by far largest flocks reported.

Teal:
Spring passage was most conspicuous at Washington where 75 - 90 were present from 6th - 14th (BU/RN et al). Holywell, Grindon and Holy Island were amongst some of the 10 other waters that held up to 45 between 14th - 22nd.

Gadwall: Single birds were at Gosforth on 7th (BG) and at Grindon on 21st (ERM).

Wigeon:
Spring passage, involving birds returning N., was conspicuous at many waters. Budle Boy of course still held 1100 on 7th (BRS) when 320 were at Hoselaw in the N.W. (LGM/MN) but Grindon held up to 180 for most of month (IHA/RG et al) and Derwent 100 - 115 (RN/RG et al) 90 off St. Marys on 8th (B & ME) and up to 55 at Holywell in mid-month (CED) were further examples of larger gatherings.

Pintail:
Spring Passage was suggested by records of 1 at Holywell on 13th - 21st (CED et al), 2 - at Washington between 14th - 23rd (RN/PK/BU) and 5 on Holy Island on 28th (ERM/LGM).

Shoveler:
An influx after about 13th, being most notable at Holywell where 4 - 8 were noted on several dates until 26th (CED/BG/B & ME). Up to 3 also noted at Gosforth, Havannah, Washington and Grindon. At Hoselaw in the N.W. 6 on 7th and 11 on 23rd (LGM/MN/CMA).

Scaup: On 7th, 1 at Berwick (LGM) and 5 N. off Annstead (BRS).

Tufted Duck:
60 - 70 were largest concentrations, being noted at Gosforth on 7th and 22nd (BG/SJH).
Bolam on 6th (IK), Hoselaw on 7th (MN/LGM), Holywell on 14th (CED), Northumberland loughs on 13th (LGM) and Capheaton on 30th (ERM).

Pochard:
Largest counts were 107 at Hoselaw (LGM/MN), 60 at Gosforth (BG), 50 at Bolam (IK) and 50 at Hartburn (JSB) all on 6th/7th. Holywell held largest numbers of all other waters with 29 - 34 between 6th - 14th (CED et al).

Goldeneye:
Again Tweedmouth held largest numbers with 220 there on 7th (LGM/MN) but further up the river 35 were at Coldstream/Carham and 19 were at Hoselaw on same day. Elsewhere, 32 - 36 on the Northumberland Loughs between 13th - 27th, max. 18 at Whittle Dene on 6th (EG et al), 16 at Capheaton on 30th (EHM), 14 at Hartburn on 30th and 13 at Alnmouth on 13th (IHA) with smaller numbers at many other waters.

Long-tailed Duck:
20 off Bamburgh on 7th was only record (RN).

Common Scoter: 103 off Bamburgh on 7th (RN) and a small flock off Alnmouth (BG) were only records.

Red-breasted Merganser:

31 off Holy Island on 28th (ERM/LGM) was by far largest concentration. Also noted off
Newton (1 on 14th - 21st) and Almmouth (7 on 13th).

/Goosander

Goosander: 39 at Derwent on 13th was largest gathering (RN) but on 7th, 30 were on Tweed at Coldstream/Carham (LGM/MN). Double figures were also noted at Whittle Dene, 11 on 2nd, and Wingates, 12 on 30th (ERM) but up to 7 were noted at several of the other usual localities.

Smew: Last noted at Whittle Dene on 7th when 1 only was present (BG/J & RMcC).

Budle Bay held 150 on 7th (RN), and on 13th a total of 18 were in Alnmouth/Amble harbours (J & RMcC). 2 at Washington on 6th (RN) and 2 at Gosforth Park on 20th (MR) suggested late overland passage. Also 3 S. off Seaton Sluice on 29th (SJH).

Grey Lag Goose: The largest flocks were just over the Border in N.W. with 285 at Spronston and 101 at Hoselaw on 7th (LGM/MN). The Budle Bay flock reduced from 70 on 7th to 41 by 21st (BRS et al). Elsewhere 24 were at Hartburn on 12th (CMA) and 60 at Hallington on 14th (RG/WB EL).

Brent Goose: Still 60 in Holy Island area on 7th (RN).

2 pairs at Hallington on 14th (RG/WB/EL) was only record.

Mute Swan: 92 at Tweedmouth on 7th (LGM/MN) and 14 at Amble on 13th (J & RMcC) were largest counts.

Some interesting counts as return passage continued. APRIL 1971 BULLETIN

SUMMARY

A very mixed month with a combination of early and late arrivals. With high pressure to the N. off the Country and a low pressure centre over France, moderate NF winds brought a heavy movement of Fulmars, Lesser Black-Backs and Common Gulls on 3rd/4th. As the high transferred E. into Scandinavia and the low slowly receded into the Bay of Biscay, winds became more Easterly and with low cloud cover between 6th - 9th a few Great Grey Shrikes made landfall and the first Willow Warblers and Garganey were seen. The weather became more settled during the next few days as a High centre was located over Britain but heavy cloud cover over N. France was probably responsible for the arrival of only a few Summer visitors.

A ridge of high pressure accompanied by clearing skies extended N. from France on 17th and a few more Summer migrants arrived including an Osprey but it was not until after 20th that the bulk arrived under smilar but warmer conditions. By 23rd the same High centre had transferred NE to Scandinavia and with SE winds traversing almost the whole of central and N Europe many continental migrants made landfall on E. coast of Britain. Most of the regular Summer migrants were involved but the more interesting species included another Osprey, Red-footed Falcon, Crane, Little Gull, Wryneck, Black Redstart and a few Lesser Whitethroats. The month terminated with a Black Term on 28th and a late flock of Barnacle Geese on 29th but Common Whitethroats and Garden Warblers had still to arrive.

Fulmar: A very heavy N. movement off Hauxley on 4th reaching a peak of about 500 per hour (HRS).

Gannet:
Small numbers noted moving N. off Hauxley on 5 days between 3rd - 21st (HRS).

Cormorant:
Up to 6 were again feeding at Wallsend Swallow Pond for most of month (LJM et al).

Heron:
Passage was suggested by a number of records of mainly single birds from Holy Island,
Howick, Cresswell and Washington between 4th and 22nd. 4 at the latter on 8th (JEP) was
the largest group away from the inland feeding haunts of breeding birds.

Derwent Reservoir with 80 on 3rd (RN) and Cresswell with 70 on 13th (GU) were the only areas that held in excess of 25 during month.

Pintail: Holy Island Lough attracted up to 6 between 3rd and 25th (RA/RAK/MR et al). 1 at Linter Holy Island Lough attracted up to between ord and 2001 (MM). Geese on 29th but Common Whitethroats and Gerden Werllers had still to a

Shoveler: Noted from 12 waters mainly near coast, the 2 exceptions being Hallington (2 on 22nd) and Grindon (up to 3 most of month). Seven, on Holy Island on 25th, was largest gathering. Most of the records were probably of passage birds. In Holy Island area 1 on 4th and 14th end 3 on 25th (E. A. K/EnM).

Tufted Duck: 27 at Grindon on 9th (J & RMcC), 40 at Holywell on 10th (GU) and 72 at Capheaton on 22md (CMA) were by far largest counts, although many waters still held small parties at end of month.

Pochard: Only reported from Hallington, Gosforth, Bothal and Swallow and counts did not exceed 15.

Present on most waters, even during latter half of month and an aggregate of 112 on the Northumberland Loughs on 8th (LGM). Other counts in excess of 10 were received from Derwent (16 on 3rd), Whittle Dene (15 on 10th and still 11 on 25th) and Beal (20 on 12th).

Holy Island from 14th - 25th (Eld et.al) and 10 off Mambur Long-tailed Duck: An unusual and interesting record of 1 inland at Whitley Bay Quarry on 26th (JDMcE). Bamburgh/Holy Island area was responsible for all the other records and a max. of 30 was noted there on 12th (ERM/LGM et al). Still 8 present on 25th.

Oystercatcher: 200 at Ross on 12th (ERM) and 70 at St. Mary's on 21st (B & ME).

Bar-tailed Godwit: Only 20 remained on Fenham Flats by 18th (IGG).

<u>Green Sandpiper:</u>
The Whittle Dene bird was still present on 24th (BHT/REP et al) and 1 on the Tyne at Corbridge on 20th may have been same bird (MR).

Common Sandpiper: First noted on N. Tyne at Chollerford on 10th (per RA) and on 13th, 2 at Wylam (IHA). A few were on most rivers by 17th/18th and the species had become well established throughout area by 25th.

Redshank:
Spring passage continued throughout most of month, largest flocks being noted at Washington (max. 130 on 8th), Ross (85 on 12th), Alnmouth (100 on 18th) and Hauxley (100 on 24th).

Spotted Redshank:
1 at Holywell on 15th (MN).

Purple Sandpiper: Still 150 - 200 on the St. Mary's area on 20th/21st (B & ME/RH). Up to 25 at several other points on coast.

300 at Ross on 12th (ERM) and smaller flocks noted at many other coastal points. 1 inland at Grindon on 28th (LGM).

Sanderling: 90 at St. Mary's on 20th (RH) was by far largest flock reported.

A male at Washington on 27th/28th (RN/JEP/BU).

Lesser-Back Back Gull:
Spring passage continued throughout month both overland and at coast. 200 per hour at Annstead on 3rd suggested a peak about that time (BRS et al) whilst Scandinavian birds were noted at Hauxley (1 on 24th and 3 on 25th).

Common Gull:
Spring passage reached a peak early in month with 1000 at Widdrington, 800 at Amble and 1000 at Longhirst on 3rd (BG/EKM), 500 at Cresswell on 4th and 3 - 4000 at Derwent on 8th (MR).

Glaucous Gull: 1 at Hauxley on 4th (HRS) and 1 at Annstead on 3rd - 11th (BRS).

An adult on Holy Island on 25th (BL).

1 reported off Ross on 17th (HW) but no notes received.

N. passage noted off Hauxley on 4th and 22nd (up to 300 per hour) and off Whitley Bay on 28th (1000 per hour).

Long-eared Owl: Noted at Gosforth, Ponteland (breeding) and Holy Island (1 on 24th).

Short-eared Owl: 1 - 3 noted at several points between Holy Island and Washington Ponds until 18th. Further inland, records from Alwinton, Blanchland, Brenkley and Ponteland probably involved breeding birds.

Kingfisher: Only reported from Witton-le-Wear (MR).

Green Woodpecker: Heard in Hulne Park and at Stocksfield.

Great Spotted Woodpecker: Noted at Gosforth, Stocksfield, Bolam and Hulne Park.

Wryneck: A passage bird at Bamburgh on 24th (BRS).

Still 3 at Whitburn on 13th (3U).

Swallow: The first was at Holywell on 14th (AB) followed by 1 at Washington on 15th (RN) and 1 at Hauxley on 16th (HRS). By 17th/18th small numbers were present in several areas, mainly near coast. A heavy movement took place on 25th when 70 per hour were noted moving N. at Newton (FC), 100 were at Hallington (MRS/ELS) and 50 at Whittle Dene (IHA/JSB).

House Martin: The first, were 2 at Hexham on 17th (BG) followed by 2 at Felton and 1 at Bamburgh on 18th. During the subsequent week, records were received from many areas as far apart as Colt Crag, Hartley and Wallsend Swallow.

Sand Martin: Late in arriving. First noted on 12th with 2 at Gosforth Park (BG) and several at Stocksfield (BL) but it was not until after 18th that they were reported with any degree of regularity.

A pair in the Border Forest on 21st but no nest could be found. Another poor year for this species.

Marsh Tit: Reported from Bolam and Howick Dene.

Fieldfare: Pre-emigration flocks were noted all over the area, mainly inland, until late in the monit. The largest were 150 at Whittle Dene on 1st, 200 at Whitley Chapel on 7th (MR), 400 at Kirkwhelpington on 3rd (IK/RO), 100 at Matfen on 5th (BEP), 700 at Bardon Mill on 17th and 100 at Bellingham on 28th (LGM). 1000 on Holy Island on 24th (BL), 170 at Hauxley on 26th (HRS), 500 at Cresswell on 26th (JEP) and 140 at Swallow Ponds, Wallsend (LJM) and 29th had probably all been forced down during adverse weather conditions.

Song Thrush: A distinct influx was noted on 24th with many on Holy Island and more than is usual at Tynemouth and Marsden (BL/KGD/RA).

Redwing: Up to 20 at 10 different localities between 8th and 24th. A species that is not often seen during April.

(2 on 23rd), North Seaton (1 on 27th) and Killingworth (2 on 28th).

Blackbird:
Passage was most obvious on Holy Island with 20 - 50 on several dates between 13th - 24th
RA/ERM). Also 50 trapped at Hauxley during month, mainly between 3rd - 19th. The nest box

in Kenton is again being used this year (MRS/ELS).

Wheatear:
Passage through coastal areas seemed to reach a peak on 22nd - 25th with 150 on Holy Island (BL), 25 at Bamburgh (BRS) and 20 at Hauxley. Birds were not as plentiful as usual inland, even at end of month.

Stonechat:
An unusual record of 1 inland at Hexham on 14th and 27th February (AJR). 1 at St. Mary's on 24th (KGD).

Whinchat:

A very early bird near Hepple on 12th (per ERM). 1 at Hauxley on 16th (HRS) and between 21st - 25th up to 10 were noted at Holy Island, Bamburgh, Hauxley, St. Mary's, Washington and Denton Burn.

Redstart:
The first was at Holywell on 21st (RH) followed by 1 at Bamburgh on 22nd (BRS). Between 24th - 27th up to 10 were noted at Holy Island, Bamburgh, Hauxley, Whitley Bay, Marsden, Slaley, Whitle Dene and Newburn.

Black Redstart:
1 in Priors Park, Tynemouth on 24th (KGD).

Robin:
Coastal influxes were noted at Hauxley on 9th - 11th and at Holy Island, Bamburgh and Hauxley on 24th/25th. Average numbers were 10 - 15 on each occasion and most were probably Continentals.

Grasshopper Warbler:

An early record of 1 at Stocksfield on 13th (per ERM) followed by singles at Prestwick Carr on 20th (ERM) and Capheaton on 22nd (CMA). An influx occurred on 23rd - 25th when up to 4 were noted at Bamburgh, Hauxley and Druridge.

Sedge Warbler: Only observed at 3 localities; 2 on Holy Island on 24th (BL), 1 at Bamburgh on 25th (DRS and 1 - 2 at Gosforth Park between 27th - 30th (ELM/BG).

Blackcap: First reported on 24th when 2 on Holy Island (BL). Next day 1 at Bamburgh and 2 at Ravensworth (LJM). Only other record was 1 in Holywell Dene on 30th (RH).

Garden Warbler: Only 1 record; 1 at Hauxley on 19th (HRS).

Whitethroat:
Also only 1 record; a male at Hauxley on 23rd - 25th (HRS).

Lesser Whitethroat:
A very early bird singing at Hartford on 10th (AB1). All other records were at the coast between 23rd - 25th with 3 on Holy Island, 3 at Hauxley and 1 at Bamburgh.

Willow Warbler:
First noted at Priors Park, Tynemouth with 1 - 3 on 8th/9th (KGD/MH) by 11th 3 were at Hexham (AJR) and on 14th singles were on Holy Island (ERM) and at Gosforth Park (BG).
Thereafter numbers steadily increased with a distinct influx on 18th and again on 22nd - 25th. An 'acredula' (N. race) was trapped at Hauxley on 19th.

CHIFFCHAFF:
First noted at Dipton (1 on 11th) and Ravensworth (1 on 12th). (BL/LJM). On 16th, 1 at South Shields (RA) and after 18th they were noted at Hulne Park, Ravensworth, Hexham, Heddon and Gosforth Park.

Goldcrest:

Small scale passage through coastal areas was noted on most days between 3rd and 25th. 25 at Howick on 4th (ERM), 12 at Hauxley on 10th - 12th (HRS) and 12 at Bamburgh on 17th -18th (BRS) were largest counts.

Pied Flycatcher:

1 at Bamburgh on 17th/18th (BRS) was the first. Only other records were 3 on Holy Island on 24th/25th and 1 at Hauxley on 25th (HRS).

Meadow Pipit:

An increase noted in Hauxley on 9th (HKS).

The first were 2 at Bamburgh on 22nd (BRS) with 5 there on 24th. On 25th, 1 at Dipton (JSB) and 1 at Whittle Dene (AJR). 1 at St. Mary's on 29th was the only other record.

White Wagtail:

On 18th, 1 at Holy Island (ERM), 2 at Cresswell and 1 at Alnmouth (KN). On 22nd, 3 at Annstead (BRS) and on 29th, 1 at Swallow Ponds, Wallsend (LJM).

Grey Wagtail:

Noted at Sheepwash, Hulne Park, Langleeford and Hartford.

Yellow Wagtail:

2 on the Farnes on 14th (IK/RO) were first. On 17th, 1 at Kielder (BL) and on 19th, 1 at Hadstone (HRS). After 21st a steady increase was noted throughout area with 12 at Whittl: Dene on 25th (AJR) being the largest gathering.

Great Grey Shrike:

Several records between 6th - 11th suggested a small influx. 1 at Whitley Bay on 6th (JDMcE), when 3 were on the Farnes (per BRS), 1 at Bamburgh on 7th until 18th (BRS), 1 at Beadnell and 1 at Cornhill on 8th (per ERM), 1 at Hauxley on 10th (HRS) and 1 at Beal from 9th - 11th (IK/RO).

MAY 1971 BULLETIN

SUMMARY

May was a very settled month as high pressure areas over Scandinavia and N. Europe dominated the weather.

With the exception of only a few days, winds were from an Easterly quarter, sometimes cool, sometimes warm and it was during these cooler, more cloudy spells that the most interesting species were seen.

From 1st - 9th Summer visitors continued to arrive, including Northern Willow Warblers, but the Easterly winds also brought a Garganey, Little Gulls, 2 Hoopoes, and a Wryneck.

With high pressure over the North Sea on 12th/13th an Osprey and a Bluethroat were seen and a Marsh Harrier turned up on 14th but with the exception of some late Whooper Swens on 16th it was not until 23rd, during S.E. winds and rain, that the remaining 'raribus were found. Holy Island produced Thrush Nightingale, Red-breasted Flycatcher and Grey headed Wagtail and during the subsequent week both Honey Buzzard and another Marsh Harrier were seen elsewhere in the county.

The more interesting breeding species included 19 pairs of Merlin, Corncrake, Turtle Dove, Kingfisher, Lesser Whitethroat and Hawfinch, and at long last Common Whitethroats seem to be returning to their former status.

By mid-month up to 6 noted from Gosforth, Heddon, Hartford, Holywell and Beamish. 1 - 3 passage birds at Hauxley, Bamburgh and Holy Island between 2nd - 31st.

Garden Warbler:

Noted at Gosforth, Hartford, Alnwick after 7th. Passage birds at Bamburgh (2 on 16th), Boulmer (1 on 9th), Hauxley (1 on 31st) and Whitley Bay (1 on 24th).

Whitethroat:

Although rather late in arriving, not being well reported on until after 8th, numbers seem to be returning to their pre 1969 status.

Lesser Whitethroat:

Between 1st - 9th mainly single birds were seen at Bamburgh, Holy Island, Budle Bay, Hauxley, Cresswell and Bolam. By 22nd about 4 pairs were in breeding territories in the Bamburgh area (BRS et al).

Willow Warbler:

Between 1st - 9th passage noted at Bamburgh (up to 30), Hauxley (up to 6) and Holywell Dene (up to 40) involved a large number of Northern birds. 1 of the race 'acredula' was seen in Howick Dene on 9th (ERM).

Chiffchaff:

Wood Warbler:

First noted on 5th - 7th when 1 was singing in Gosforth Park (BG/ERM). On 9th, 2 at Stocksfield (JSB) and 1 in Allendale (BEP). On 15th, 1 at Bamburgh (BRS) and next day 2+ in Hulne Park, Alnwick (GU). Further records from Harbottle and Tarset after 22nd (BEP/ ERM).

Spotted Flycatcher: First noted on 8th when 1 was in Holywell Dene (GU). Next day 1 in Howick Dene (EHM) and by 15th widespread throughout area.

Pied Flycatcher:

Became established in breeding areas at Dipton, Allendale, Corbridge, Wallington and Stocksfield during first week. Passage birds noted at Sunderland (4 on 1st), Bamburgh (1 on 1st and 2 on 16th) and Whitley Bay (1 on 24th), 1 in Gosforth Park on 2nd and another there on 8th - an unusual locality (DL).

Red-breasted Flycatcher:

Recorded in Northumberland for the third time in past 4 Springs with 1, a female, on Holy Island on 23rd (ERM/JAG).

Tree Pipit:

Well established in breeding areas after about 9th. Passage was particularly conspicuous at Bamburgh with 10 on 1st, 8 on 2nd and 14 on 8th (BRS).

White Wagtail:

Noted at Wallington, Upper Coquetdale and Boulmer.

Yellow Wagtail:

Noted at Annstead, Cresswell, Washington, Stanhope, Wallsend and Coquetdale.

SUMMARY

Despite the rather cool showery weather in June, breeding success seems to have been high in many species, although waders have had better years.

Sea bird movements were quite prominent on several dates particularly early in the month, when during N - NE winds, Manx Shearwaters, Fulmars, Lesser Black-Backs, Kittiwakes and Auks were all noted in unusual numbers.

Out of season records were very much in evidence with some interesting wader counts on Fenham Flats on 12th and a few records of each of Goldeneye, Red Breasted Merganser and Wigeon.

The most interesting records, however, involved a Ring-tail Harrier at the coast, 2 Ospreys, Little Ringed Plover, Black Tern, Black Guillemot and Hoopoe.

Early July has been quite spectacular in that a Sociable Plover remained at Ouston Aircort for almost a week but as far as I know it was last seen on 11th. There are less than 10 records for the British Isles.

SUMMARY

August was undoubtedly a month for sea birds and waders particularly Shearwaters, Skuas and Ruff but at the beginning of the month Black Terns and Little Gulls were prominent as high pressure and light easterlies prevailed over Denmark and N. Germany.

An incredible month with perhaps unprecedented numbers involved. Although a few had been noted beforehand, the influx seemed to occur after 14th and continued until 26th/27th. OCTOBER 1971 BULLETIN

SUMMARY

The two most significant periods of the month were 15th/16th and 23rd/28th.

On both occasions large scale arrivals of Continental Thrushes (sp) were recorded and coincided with High Air Pressure becoming established over S. Scandinavia.

Unfortunately arrivals of small migrants were virtually absent and the month was rather disappointing in this respect, although the last week in the month saw the appearance of wintering Shore Larks and Twite, and 2 Water Pipits were seen on Holy Island.

Loif Fernes on 31st (Edl) was only record.

Seabirds were also moving on 25th/28th particularly Divers, Goldeneye and Mergansers and the first Brent Geese were recorded moving off-shore at that time. Short-eared Owls seemed to suddenly increase after 23rd and an unusually large roose was located at Wallse Swallow.

During the first few days of the month Mallard, Teal and Wigeon were unusually plentiful and by end of month Wigeon numbers seem to have reached last years record max. for Fenham Flats.

Other interesting records included a few Gadwall, 3 records of Phalaropes, a possible Yellow Breasted Bunting and 3 'exotics', Snow Goose, Mandarin and Flamingo.

December was quite a mild month and with the exception of a N. movement of Divers on 12th, an apparent peak in Lapwing numbers between 4th-19th and a light northerly passage of seabirds between 27th-30th during N.E. winds with a High Pressure centre to the N. of Britain, little of interest appeared to be on the move. Shelducks were the most interesting species involved during the latter period but 2 species of Shearwater and 2 species of Skua were also noted.

In fact it was very much a month of out of season records with 5 species of Wader involved, a Chiffchaff and a lingering of moderate numbers of Shoveler. Sea birds were also conspicuous inland, particularly Cormorants, with Slavonian Grebe, Red Throated Diver, Long Tailed Duck and Brent Goose also involved.

The large herds of Whooper Swans remained throughout the month although there was a suggestion of a fall off in numbers during the latter half.

2 Mediterranean Gulls were the pride of the rarities but other unusual records included Black Necked Grebe, more Waxwings, Great Grey Shrikes and Crossbills.

TYNESIDE BIRD CLUB

Wildfowl Count - 21st November, 1971.

This was the fourth wildfowl count organised by the Club since February 1970. Unfortunately the elements were far from ideal on the count date with gale force notherly winds bringing blizzards and storms. Virtually all inland waters were frozen to a greater or lesser degree. Those wildfowl present were difficult to count due to the adverse weather conditions, especially at Lindisfarne Reserve and elsewhere along the coast, and results should be considered with caution as undoubtedly birds will have been missed.

Nevertheless it has been possible to prepare a comprehensive table showing the results of the count and it is satisfying to note that virtually all the important waters were covered. Kimmer Lough, Hisehope Reservoir, Linn Heads, Little Swinburn, Waskerley Reservoir and Burnhope Reservoir were not covered but as most of these localities are in high, open areas it is probably that the weather made them untenable to all but a few birds. Regretably only the short length of the River Tweed between Sprouston and Wark could be covered and it would be helpful if in future counts someone could undertake to cover the remaining stretch from Wark to Berwick and also count Holburn Moss and Swinhoe Lakes, which were likewise uncovered. Cowey Sike and Smiddyshaw Reservoirs each drew a blank.
